setting (n.) where a story takes place, including the place and time

character (n.) a person, animal, or figure in literature

Sometimes the setting is just the backdrop for the story, but in other cases, authors make the setting central to the story. In fact, sometimes the setting can even be as important as a main character.

Notice the ways the setting is important to the story in *Lord of the Flies*. Respond to the following questions and provide textual evidence for your thinking.

1.	Could this story	y have taken	place any	/where else? I	Explain wh	y or why	y not.
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2. How does the impression of the setting change from the beginning of the story to the end? Cite specific examples from the text that show how the author describes the setting in the beginning and how he describes it at later points in the story.

3. How does the setting contribute to the meaning of the story? Provide specific examples to support your thinking.
