symbol (n.) an action or an object that stands for an idea or means something other than literal meaning.

A symbol helps to reveal meaning in a story. There may be several layers of meaning to any given symbol.

To help you think about the symbols in *Lord of the Flies*, do the following for each symbol listed below:

- a. Describe the symbol's meaning in a few words.
- **b.** Provide one passage from the text, including the page number(s), that helps show the symbol's meaning.

1. The conch

Meaning:

the order created by civilization's rules
