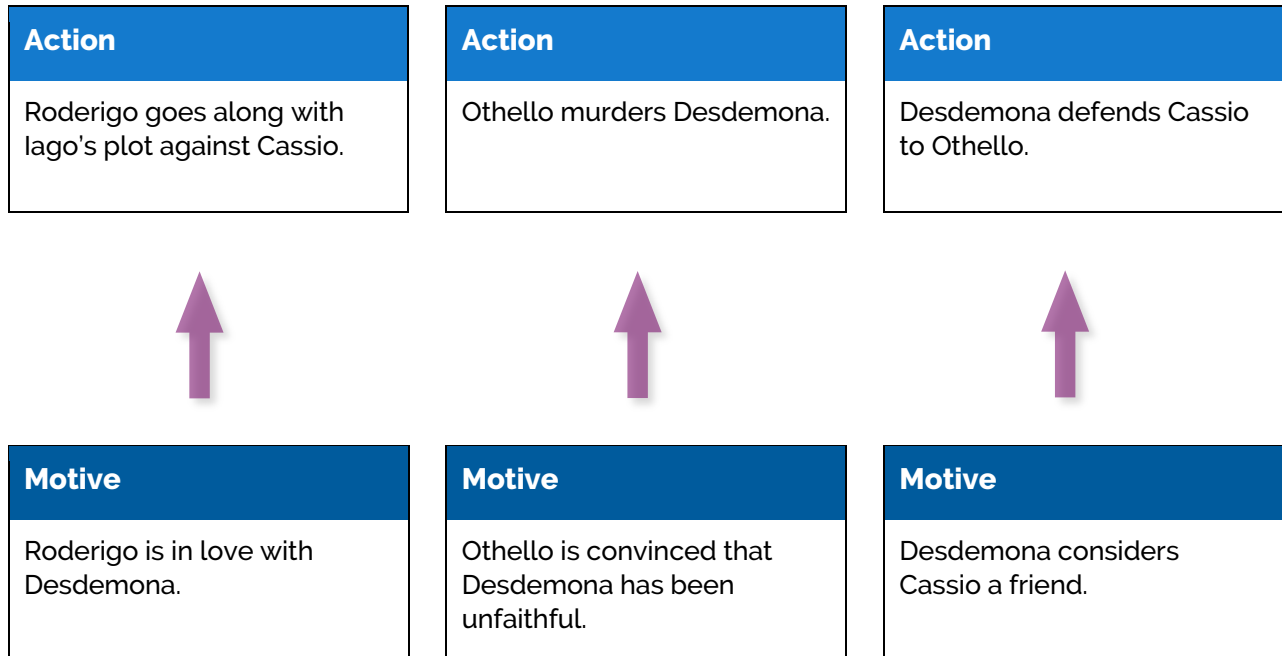




Othello Iago's Motives

In literature, a **motive** is a character's reason for experiencing an emotion, taking an action, or pursuing a goal. It is the reason a character does what he/she does.

Shakespeare's characters often have very clear motives.



Iago's motives for destroying Othello are slightly more complicated than these. Identify three possible motives for Iago's actions and list them in the graphic organizer. Include text evidence for each motive. Then select the motive you think is most likely. On a separate sheet of paper, write a paragraph supporting your choice. Be sure to support your claim with text evidence.
